Traditional forms of verse use established rhythmic patterns called meters (meter means "measure" in Greek), and that's what meters are — premeasured patterns of stressed and unstressed syllables.. Much of English poetry is written in lines that string together one or more feet (individual rhythmical units). Feet are the individual building blocks of meter.

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
